Project Update - Fieldwork Restarts!

After a comprehensive and lengthly review of safety procedures both at Northumrbria University and by the Ugandan National Council of Science and Technology (UNCST), RYVU has been given the green light to restart fieldwork, subject to strict adherence to Covid-19 safety procedures.

Robert and Moses have been busy linking up with the youth advisory boards across the four settlement areas to get the most up to date information on the ground, before beginning the pilot of the mobile phone survey in the next couple of weeks. This will be followed by the full survey which is hoping to collect data from over 1,500 young refugees on their experiences in relation to volunteering in Uganda.

Co-I Dr. Aisling O'Loghlen will be leaving the RYVU team shortly, however the project management aspects of the project will be in good hands with the addition of Dr. Owen Boyle to the team. The search for a new Co-I is also underway.
